2	ACPDHS – sector developments and context Professor Wronksi provided an overview of sector developments and context to inform discussions by members. IHPA - Teaching, Training & Research Working Group (TTRWG) and Research Working Group (RWG) update Confirmed that funding to states will continue to be activity based IHPA costing studies of teaching, training and research were recently conducted in Queensland, South Australia and Western Australia. The aim of the costing study was to develop a costed data file to inform the development of the teaching, training and research classification. The National Health Reform Agreement 2011 requires that IHPA provide advice to the COAG Health Council on the feasibility of transitioning	JCU, UniSA, CSU, Griffith and Curtin to provide data and relevant vignettes for collation to inform further advice to DOH Data to be sent to EO (ACPDHS@jcu.edu.au) by Friday, 6 November.

- funding for teaching training and research to an activity based funding (ABF) system by 30 June 2018.
- Member discussion points included the importance of distinguishing between costs of research and education and the value of budgetary line items and reporting measures
- Noted that IHPA applies only to the public sector whereas CTF is designed to extend and innovate clinical education capacity across sectors

Clinical Training Fund CTF)- Future of funding yet to be confirmed, which impacts decision making about 2016 placements, services and ongoing employment of staff.

- Key to highlight success in addressing maldistribution.
 - Action: Sample data to be collated reflecting the impact of CTF funding on the distribution of new clinical placements to address geographic and sector maldistribution.

- > Opportunities for increasing workforce mobility following signing of FTA

3 Research developments

Dr Fiona Cameron, Executive Director, Biological Sciences and Biotechnology, ARC provided an overview of the **Industrial Transformation Research Programme** (ITRP) and the 5 key priority areas. Dr Cameron noted that

- > To date there had been no successful application from the health sector
- Business priorities were the key point to stress in applications for either the Industrial Transformation Research Hubs or the Industrial Transformation Training Centres.

Ms Leanne Harvey, Executive General Manager, ARC provided an update on **ERA** issues and recent developments.

- Primary aim of ERA is the quality of Australian research. Provides a national stocktake which
 - o aids identification of areas of excellence and areas for support
 - o enables benchmarking internationally
 - o assists universities to understand own strengths and weaknesses
- Stressed that ERA rating and metrics to be appropriate for each discipline. Metrics to be robust and replicable.
 - o Members noted constraints for many allied health professions with current metrics
 - Data reflecting the publication location of Australian content to be published in 2016
 - ➤ ERA ratings due for major review in 2018. Ms Harvey indicated that she would be happy to receive input prior to this (including examples at 6 digit code level)
 - Useful to review Evaluation Dashboard which is sent to each university
 - o NB: Annual census date 31 March
 - Members suggested that adding ACPDHS to the consultation contact list would aid their input to future reviews of ERA ratings.
