

Scoring Criteria for ACDHS Awards

Allied Health Education – Innovation Award

1. Originality and Creativity (30%)

- Degree of innovation in the approach.
- Uniqueness of the educational methods or tools used.
- Evidence of creative problem-solving in education.

2. Impact on Learning (30%)

- Effectiveness in improving learning outcomes.
- Demonstrated positive feedback from students and educators.
- Measurable improvements in knowledge retention and application.

3. Implementation and Sustainability (20%)

- Feasibility of widespread adoption.
- Cost-effectiveness and resource efficiency.
- Plans for sustaining the initiative over time.

4. Contribution to the Field (20%)

- Advancements made in allied health education.
- Potential for the initiative to be a model for others.
- Contributions to professional development within the field.

Allied Health First Nations - Leadership/Engagement Award

1. Leadership in Advocacy (25%)

- Evidence of strong leadership in promoting First Nations health issues.
- Initiatives taken to advocate for the health needs of First Nations communities.

2. Engagement and Collaboration (25%)

- Degree of engagement with First Nations communities.
- Collaborations with First Nations organisations or groups.
- Inclusive and respectful approach to community involvement.





3. Impact and Outcomes (30%)

- Tangible improvements in health outcomes for First Nations communities.
- Success stories and testimonials from community members.
- Measurable impact of the initiatives led by the nominee.

4. Cultural Competence (20%)

- Demonstrated understanding and respect for First Nations cultures.
- Integration of cultural knowledge into healthcare practices.
- Efforts to educate others about cultural competence.

Allied Health Research – Impact Award

1. Research Quality and Rigor (30%)

- Methodological soundness and innovation.
- Thoroughness and reliability of the research process.
- Peer-reviewed publications and citations.

2. Impact on Practice (30%)

- Practical application of research findings in the field.
- Evidence of changes in clinical practice or policy.
- Adoption of research outcomes by health professionals.

3. Contribution to Knowledge (20%)

- Advancements made in the allied health sciences.
- Filling of gaps in existing knowledge.
- Influence on future research directions.

4. Community and Stakeholder Engagement (20%)

- Involvement of community and stakeholders in the research process.
- Dissemination of findings to relevant audiences.
- Impact on public awareness and understanding of health issues.
